You Have a Conflict At Work, Now What? A DIY Guide: This new DIY guide, designed by the **Jewish Social Justice Roundtable**, supports staff members to find more ease with colleagues and organizations to become better places to work by offering tools to navigate through workplace conflict in productive, generative ways. Starting with foundational steps that many people skip, like identifying if there is a conflict and if it should be addressed, the guide moves to exercises and tips for effectively moving through challenging conversations. Leaders, Consider Pausing Before Acting on Employee Feedback

Acting on employee feedback is essential to being a good leader. But a new study shows that how fast leaders change in response to this feedback shapes whether employees see them as authentic—and how likely they'll be to share insights in the future. Across field and experimental studies, rapid shifts—especially on hard-to-change behaviors like listening—appeared disingenuous, dampening their willingness to give future feedback. Gradual change, however, was more often read as sincere growth. Before responding to feedback, leaders should pause, think deeply about the feedback, and communicate both intentions and process—verbally and nonverbally—to align visible behavior with signals of meaningful change. Managing the pace and explanation of change builds credibility and strengthens employees' willingness to share valuable insights down the line. **Read the full article [HERE](#)**
