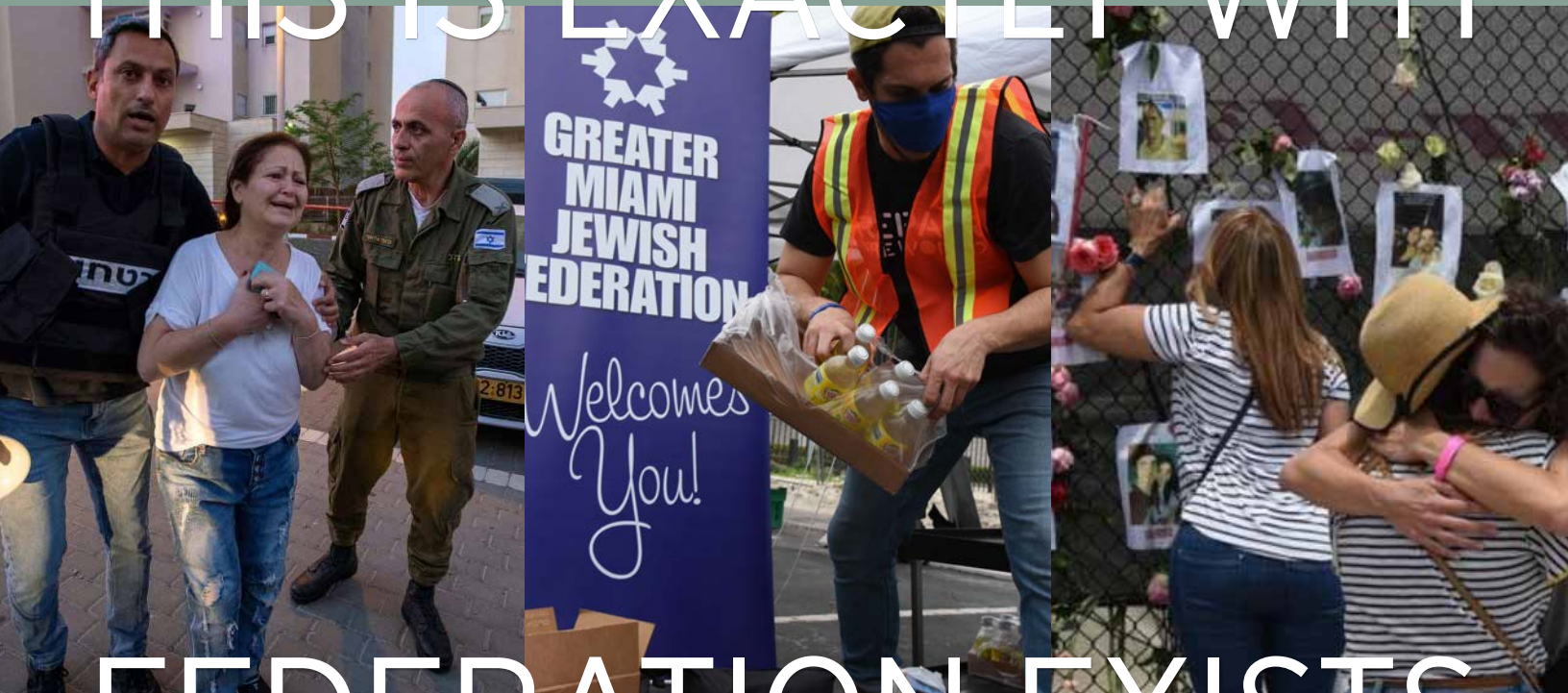

A Message to Our Community

May 2022

This Report to the Community is presented with the goal of summarizing a year of extraordinary activity in response to historical challenges and, at the same time, expressing our collective gratitude to the thousands of donors whose support makes our work possible. It tells our story in facts and figures: how we've allocated funds; assisted those in need; and created and nurtured Jewish community both at home and abroad. It's a means to assess our impact in numbers. It's also an opportunity to reflect.

Year two of the COVID-19 pandemic saw our continued response to what constitutes the worst global health crisis of our time. Food insufficiency, unemployment, financial difficulties, psychological stress and social isolation required Federation to increase emergency funding of critical human service programs and for vulnerable individuals here in Miami as the coronavirus compounded existing urgent needs. Additional support for our overseas partners enabled them to provide similar support for our extended family in Israel and around the world.

The year 2021, in which assaults against the Jewish people intensified both locally and globally, was cited in a joint report by The Jewish Agency for Israel and the World Zionist Organization as the worst year for antisemitic attacks in a decade. In Israel, the month of May alone saw close to 3,500 missiles fired from Gaza, destroying homes and property and wreaking havoc on innocent Israelis forced into bomb shelters. Through The Jewish Agency's Fund for Victims of Terror, we were able to attend to those who experienced hardship as a result. In Florida, antisemitism skyrocketed, as it did nationwide. Responding to this alarming trend, Federation was on the front line in mobilizing public opinion and action, as well as providing the point of first contact with local law enforcement through our Office of Community Security. We convened a Virtual Town Hall with the entire South Florida Congressional Delegation to thank them for their support of Israel and encourage their vigilant opposition to antisemitism and hate of all forms. Even during the pandemic, thousands gathered in person and online at an Interfaith Rally Against Antisemitism held at the Holocaust Memorial Miami Beach.

Unimaginable tragedy struck the Miami community on June 24 at 1:25 a.m. when the Champlain Towers South condominium in Surfside collapsed. Federation mobilized immediately, activating various partners to provide short-term disaster response services to victims' families, first responders and all those affected by the devastation. Federation's Mishkan Miami rabbis and chaplains were dispatched to offer spiritual and grief counseling. Our primary human services partner, Jewish Community Services of South Florida (JCS), was on-site throughout the crisis to provide trauma counseling and to help survivors access benefits, insurance, legal advice and relief programs. Federation also supplied – and continues to provide – financial help to people who lost all their possessions, as well as those who lost beloved family members. Once again, the infrastructure, the partnerships and the relationships Federation has developed over decades enabled us to play a meaningful role in bringing comfort and assistance to individuals and to a community deeply scarred by trauma and loss.


Our mission to bolster the Jewish community and its institutions endures. Adding to millions of dollars in initial crisis response grants, through the second year of the pandemic, Federation allocated an additional \$2 million to 10 Jewish day schools to upgrade facilities to provide a safe and healthy environment for our community's children. This was in addition to our yearly financial allocations for Jewish day school education and scholarships for 231 children to attend Jewish summer camp. We maintained our monthly Free Kosher Food Distribution events for those still facing food insufficiency and provided grants and loans for people who needed additional support due to the pandemic.

The 2021-2022 Report to the Community is published at a time when the initial cloud of the pandemic appears to be lifting, and yet there are still so many in need of our ongoing support. Even before COVID-19 struck our community, one in every eight Jews in Miami benefited from services funded by our Federation. As we navigate a new normal, we will strive in everything we do and with every life we touch, to embody the Talmudic dictum, "all of Israel is responsible, one for the other."


This is exactly why Federation exists.

It is our honor to present this Report chronicling the significance of your investment in the Greater Miami Jewish Federation. In a year filled with tremendous community suffering and upheaval, your contribution has served to advance and strengthen the Jewish people locally, in Israel and in more than 70 other countries around the world. Thank you for supporting the holy work we do together and for enabling us to be your partners in repairing the world.

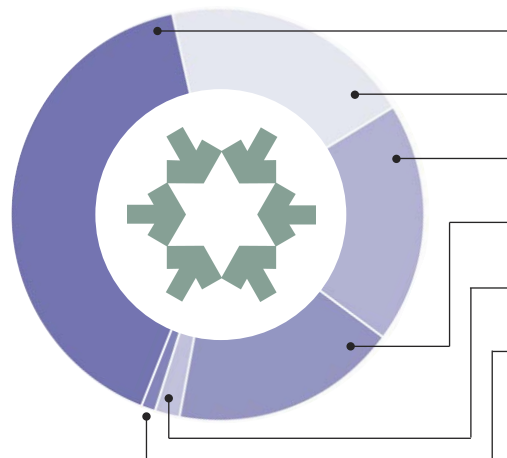

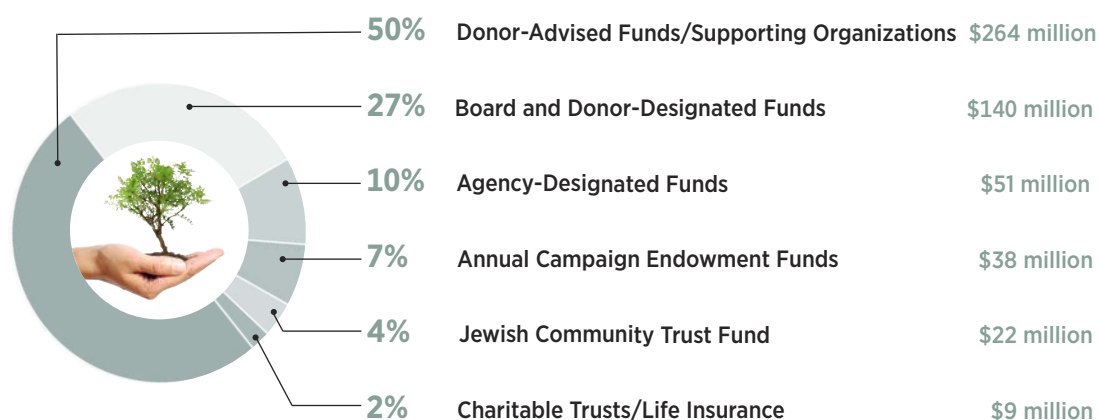

Since 2013, more than **800** individuals and families have signed declarations of intent through **Create a Jewish Legacy**, benefitting Miami's Jewish agencies, synagogues, day schools and Federation and creating more than **\$50 million** in gifts to strengthen our future.

AS OF JUNE 30, 2021,

The Foundation held **\$524 million** in assets, representing **764** donor families and organizations. During 2021, The Foundation received **\$114 million** in contributions and bequests to new and existing funds and **\$65 million** in grants were distributed to Federation, local beneficiary agencies and other charities.

The Jewish Community

Trust Fund is Federation's unrestricted endowment made up primarily of bequests, large and small, from donors seeking to enhance our collective Jewish future.

Campaign Endowment Funds

(which include **Lion of Judah Endowment Funds/Forever Lion** or **Forever Pacesetter Funds**) are permanent endowments established by donors to perpetuate an annual gift to the Federation/UJA Campaign. These funds provide support in the name of the donor or loved one to Federation to care for those in need, meet unexpected challenges and plan for the future.

Donor-Advised or Philanthropic

Funds are like "charitable bank accounts," allowing donors/families to make charitable contributions when the time is right, while realizing important tax advantages.

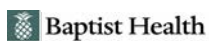
