Campaign Update

- The **2023** General Campaign has raised \$17.4 million from more than 4,200 donors with a card-for-card increase of 21.05 percent.
- The Women's Campaign has raised \$6.3 million from more than 2,400 donors with a card-for-card increase of 40.22 percent.

Israel at 75 Miami Mega Mission

The words of Theodor Herzl, "If you will it, it is no dream," came to life during the much-awaited Greater Miami Jewish Federation Israel 75 Miami Mega Mission. For its 800-plus participants, the weeklong journey through the Jewish homeland felt nothing short of a fantastic dream, one they will remember forever. Touted as the Celebration of a Lifetime, the Mission brought all 20 buses together a number of times throughout the week for Mega Events. Highlights included a Desert Extravaganza with a spectacular drone show that lit up the sky and a poignant reenactment of the creation of the State of Israel during the transition ceremony between Israel's Memorial Day for Fallen Soldiers and Victims of Terror (Yom Ha'Zikaron) and Israel's Independence Day (Yom Ha'Atzmaut). Daily Mission visits introduced participants to organizations that benefit from Federation support and inspired their generosity. Mission participants contributed more than \$3 million to the Greater Miami Jewish Federation Annual Campaign, in addition to nearly \$2 million in estimated future gifts made through The Foundation. WE are so excited to report that the mission generated over 120 new Lions of Judah. We welcome them to this unique sisterhood. The Women of Our Community



Judy Gilbert-Gould, a lifelong resident of Miami, recently passed away at the age of 88. She was the daughter of Greater Miami Jewish Federation Founding President Stanley C. Myers and Martha M. Myers. Judy was part of a family whose DNA instilled a commitment to serve the community and improve the lives of others. This calling paved the way for an extraordinarily fulfilling life journey. She was a Lion of Judah-level donor for more than 20 years. "I was born into a family where it was understood that each member had an obligation to make the world a better place in which to live," recorded Judy in her life story in The Foundation's Book of Life, citing that she learned this not through words, but through her parents' deeds. As a young woman. Judy became involved in the National Council of Jewish Women. eventually serving as President of its Miami chapter. In recognition of her service, Judy was awarded NCJW's highest honor, the Hannah G. Solomon Award for her commitment to the advancement of human welfare. Judy later served in several professional capacities such as working under then-Dade County State Attorney Janet Reno. She was the Director of Victim-Witness Services in the State Attorney's Office to help prepare rape victims to testify in court. She also served as Director of the Southeast Region of American Jewish Congress. In 1983, Judy joined the Greater Miami Jewish Federation, where she served for many years as Director of Federation's Jewish Community Relations Council. In 2007, Judy received the Myron J. Brodie Award for Professional Excellence, in recognition of her professionalism and profound commitment to furthering the mission of Federation and exemplifying the highest standards of Jewish communal service. Judy retired from Federation in 2008, after 25 years of dedicated service. One of the dividends of Judy's service to Federation were the many people with whom she built long-lasting friendships, many of whom looked upon Judy as a role model and mentor. Judy loved her children and grandchildren and was immensely proud of their accomplishments. She had an enormous impact on their lives and the lives of all those she touched. She lived a life that mattered, a life of contribution. "My family is my legacy," wrote Judy, "and I hope and trust they will continue to strengthen the link of Jewish continuity begun so many years ago." Judy is survived by her children, Bobby (Nancy) Gilbert, Carolyn Gilbert Epstein, and Mark (Belinda) Gilbert, as well as eight grandchildren, Geoff, Stuart, Evan, Lee, Anabel, Brett, Grace and Madeline.
