

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE FROM ELISE UDELSON



"Our lives no longer belong to us alone; they belong to all those who need us desperately." This quote from Elie Wiesel's Nobel Peace Prize acceptance speech on December 10, 1986 is the Women's Philanthropy (WP) theme this year. So many of his remarks resonated with me. His words seem to always speak to us. They challenge us. They inspire us. And they remain relevant.

Never before have we felt so strongly that we are needed than we have since 10/7 (almost a year ago) and most recently, after the six hostages were brutally murdered in captivity. With heavy hearts, we have felt the urgency to respond, to come together and to make a difference wherever and whenever possible.

This summer, I participated in a national Federation leadership mission to Berlin and Israel with about 50 others from all over North America who represented their respective communities. It was promising to see that Germany has taken a stance to be an ally for Israel, does not tolerate the rise in antisemitism and calls out terrorism. Germany, who would have imagined? This was my second trip to Israel since 10/7. Life appeared to look a bit more "normal" than when I was there in December, but when you speak with people you still feel the impact and the burden they all carry. Yet, when they heard from where we traveled, they couldn't thank us enough for just showing up, for supporting them and for knowing they are not alone! It really mattered to them and it really matters to all those who need us desperately in our backyard or wherever in this world they live.

Jewish Miami is a truly unique community, especially post 10/7. For the most part, we are not being harassed, our college campuses are not seeing protests like in other places, we wear a Star of David necklace or BringThemHome tag or a *kippa* and feel relatively safe. That is not the case everywhere and we should not and cannot take it for granted. There is only one way to ensure that. We must all be involved and do what we can. So, as we approach the High Holidays and this inherent period of reflection, introspection and new beginnings, join us in this effort.

Get connected, raise awareness, make a commitment, speak out, learn the facts. When you give your time, treasure and talent, your life will be enriched in return. I know because mine has!

We have so many events planned for the year. Checkout our calendar at the end of the newsletter filled with educational, cultural and volunteer opportunities. We encourage you to join us and I hope to meet you there.

Together we will fight evil and make the world a better place for all of us.

WOMEN OF VALOR



Mama Rachel is weeping for her child. The ancient words of the prophet Jeremiah haunt us:

A cry is heard in Ramah – Wailing, bitter weeping – Rachel weeping for her children. She refuses to be comforted For her children, who are gone.

This biblical verse refers to our matriarch, Rachel. It speaks to the timeless grief as she weeps for her children, the pain of exile and the fear of annihilation, refusing comfort until her precious ones are back in her arms. They resonate today for Jews all around the world, united in anguish as our hearts are shattered yet again after October 7.

Another Rachel has more recently gripped us with the grief of a bereft Jewish mother. Rachel Goldberg-Polin has demonstrated the epitome of both parental love and pain in biblical proportions for her beloved son, Hersh. For 330 days, she spoke and shouted, cried and prayed on every platform in every corner of the world, most recently inspiring chants of "Bring Them Home Now" from tens of thousands at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

But as we learned, Hersh, Eden Yerushalmi, Carmel Gat, Almog Sarusi, Alex Lubanov and Ori Danino were executed deep underground in the tunnels of Gaza. They would not return home alive.

Why did Hersh's death in particular hit us so hard? It is because of Rachel. With her relentless advocacy, eloquence, dignity and determination, she fought with hope and righteousness. A pillar of strength, her voice carried the weight of the entire Jewish people. A force, a lioness, a Jewish mother who never gave up and led us all to have hope as well. She inspired countless others to take on her daily ritual of marking a piece of masking tape with the number of days since the hostages were taken captive. It served as a constant reminder to her, but also to all of us. Echoes of both Rachels' cries command us to settle for nothing less than a future where no mother has to cry out for her child.

As long as any "Rachel" weeps, our work is not done. We are all Rachels and must continue to be the voice, the hands and the builders of a better world.

May the memory of Hersh, and all those lost on and since October 7, 2023, be a blessing.
