Dahlia Bendavid, Director of Israel and Overseas, Greater Miami Jewish Federation



Dahlia Bendavid is the Director of the Israel and Overseas department at the Greater Miami Jewish Federation. She directs the Israel and Overseas Committee, a standing committee that is committed to engaged global justice through philanthropy. In this role, Dahlia develops and oversees all aspects of Miami's international partnerships including the allocation of approximately \$8 million dollars to overseas recipients.

Dahlia has extensive work experience in nonprofit management. She worked at UNICEF in the private sector fundraising department, and as a development officer at AVSC International, a women's health nonprofit organization. She holds a master's degree in industrial labor relations/human resource management from Cornell University/Baruch College, CUNY.

Maayan Blum, Director of Community Planning, Greater Miami Jewish Federation



Since moving to Miami from Jerusalem in 2000, Maayan has been passionate about working in the non-profit sector. As the Director of Community Planning at the Greater Miami Jewish Federation, she manages the relationships, oversight process and allocation of funds with Federation's local partner agencies, day schools and synagogues. Additionally she oversees Federation's inclusion and engagement programs, as well as the Jewish Volunteer Center and Hebrew Free Loan Association of South Florida, a Federation subsidiary.

Prior to entering the Jewish Communal field, Maayan directed the Miami Quality Management Department of Children's Home Society of FL, a statewide non-profit child welfare agency dedicated to transforming the lives of children in foster care and breaking the cycle of abuse and neglect.

She earned her MBA from the University of Miami, and holds a bachelor's degree from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. Maayan is proud to have served in the Israel Defense Forces as a chief airborne medic instructor in the Air Force medical unit. She lives with her husband and two sons in Miami Shores.





Gidi Grinstein, President, Reut Institute



Gidi Grinstein is the Founder and President of Reut. Gidi has been involved for many years in public policy and political affairs in Israel. Gidi played an important role in designing the Birthright Israel Program between 1995 and 1999, when he established and led the Israeli team that transformed the original vision into a model that is now the largest and most successful project in the Jewish World.

From 1999-2001, Gidi served as the Secretary of the Israeli delegation to the Peace Negotiations with the PLO under Prime Minister Ehud Barak. He participated in the 2000 Camp David Summit and in the negotiations on the Clinton Ideas.

Gidi's first book <u>Flexigidity: The Invisible Hand of Jewish Adaptability</u> was published in 2013.

He also holds undergraduate and graduate degrees in Oriental Studies from the University of Pennsylvania.
